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Follow the "Light of Christ" All Year

The end of the year, especially the time between Christmas and New Year's, is an interesting time of the year. It seems to be the only time during the year when we stop, look around and take stock of our situation. We look back and remember the good and bad events of the year being concluded. And we look forward to the coming year making resolutions and predictions for the months ahead. But then, beginning January 2nd or perhaps sooner, our culture forgets about the Spirit of Christmas, about peace, love and tranquility and resumes a more worldly approach to life. And during the rest of the year, it appears we just focus on the current, day-to-day events of living and forget about the past or future and where we are going.

For Christians, the New Year brings the season of Epiphany, one of the oldest seasons of the church year. Epiphany is sometimes referred to as the



third part of Christmas with Advent and Christmas being the first two parts. The season of Epiphany emphasizes the breadth of God's love for all the people of the world and His plan for salvation for all people. For that reason, Epiphany is also referred to as the Gentiles' Christmas.

Epiphany, which comes from a Greek word that means "manifest" or made known, begins with the visit of the Magi representing Jesus' coming to save both Jews and Gentiles alike. It continues with His baptism, the choosing of his disciples, His first miracles and concludes with the Transfiguration after which He turns his face toward Jerusalem and the crucifixion.

The season of Epiphany encourages us to remember and follow the "Light of Christ," the light that guides and directs us today and will guide us every day of the coming year. Epiphany reminds us that Christ is the "Light that shines in the darkness." This year, may we hold on to God's promise to drive out the darkness of sin and bring us salvation.

Like the Magi, we are on a journey of faith in the coming year. In the season of Epiphany may we seek Christ with a spirit of openness, humility and perseverance, trusting that God has revealed Himself to us in Christ. May this Christ light our pathways as we journey through the season of Epiphany and the rest of 2024.

Chicken Bisque Soup

From the Gables, (formally) Corvallis, Oregon

1 (3 pound) stewing hen 16 cups water 3 Tablespoons salt ½ cup melted butter 1 cup flour1

½ cup chopped chicken (taken from above)

½ cup chopped pimientos ½ cup blanched peppers 1 teaspoon MSG ½ teaspoon pepper 3-4 drops yellow food coloring



Boil the stewing hen in water with salt until tender. Strain off 8 cups of stock. Make a roux of the butter and flour. Add strained stock and simmer for 15 minutes. Carve ½ cup chicken from carcass and add to mixture. Add remaining ingredients, stirring constantly until heated. Serve at once.

- Write any desires for your funeral or celebration of life.
- Attend to any rifts with family or friends.
- Be at peace.

The clamor of daily life is such a powerful distraction that we easily assume there will be ample time to take care of things "later." But we all know that any of us could go at any time. Don't wait. Why not enjoy today and every day knowing that whenever our time comes, while our dear ones will grieve, their stress will be lighter for the preparations we made. And that, my friends, is truly a gift.
